# Amy was appointed OCUL Executive Director in 2022, following a North America-wide search.

Amy has worked for OCUL since May 2003 when she was first hired as a User Support Librarian for the implementation of a consortia-wide interlibrary loan system. Subsequent roles included serving as the Scholars Portal Client Services Librarian, Associate Director responsible for Research and Member Services, and Interim Associate Director of Scholars Portal. From 2015 to 2017, Amy took a brief hiatus from Scholars Portal to manage OCUL's Collaborative Futures project. In this role, she coordinated the consortium's preparations for and procurement of a shared library services platform and was instrumental in facilitating the vision of "radical collaboration" underpinning the initiative.

# **COLLABORATIVE FUTURES**



For nearly ten years, Collaborative Futures has advanced a shared vision for library management systems that sees Ontario university students, faculty and researchers accessing a large and diverse province-wide library collection, seamlessly moving between print and digital resources.

A major outcome of this vision is <u>Omni, the academic search tool</u>, and a shared network that together form a singular pathway for users to discover resources for their research, teaching and learning.

Through Omni, students, faculty and researchers can access over 25 million print resources and pick up requested items from any of the 18 partner universities in Ontario. Omni is also where they can search for e-resources. And it is thanks to the efforts of the Network Zone E-Resources Management Working Group and the Network Zone Metadata Maintenance Working Group that these resources are more discoverable, requestable and accurate in the search tool.

These inter-university teams ensure the accuracy of entitlements and licensing terms of use and the quality of metadata for shared records and common resources on behalf of whole network. Their aim is to make Omni work the best it can for the libraries that manage the system and the students, faculty and researchers who rely on it. It is critical work that supports OCUL's vision of shared infrastructure in support of a large, diverse Ontario-wide library collection, and illustrates the power of radical collaboration. In 2022-23, these Working Groups have cleaned and corrected more than one million records and activated 300 e-resource packages in the shared network to improve search and access in Omni.

### MEET THE OCUL TEAM



ANIKA ERVIN-WARD Assistant Director, Collaborative Initiatives Anika has been part of the OCUL team since 2012 and has served in three roles: first as the Administration and Communications Coordinator, then as interim Executive Director, and now as the Assistant Director, Collaborative Initiatives.

She works directly with OCUL members through committees and working groups, to ensure all the threads of an often-complex network of activities are brought together cohesively. As she explains of her Collaborative Initiatives position, "It's bringing people together to make decisions and share knowledge that helps build capacity in our member libraries."

Anika holds a BA (Honours) and a Bachelor of Commerce, plus a PhD in Cinema Studies.



ALEX FLETCHER Omni Technology and Network Zone Specialist Alex joined OCUL in summer 2022, after more than a decade at Queen's University Library and prior to that as a member of the university's central IT group. It was his work with Collaborative Futures groups during and after the library's Alma migration that broadened his experience to larger scale projects. When asked about his role with OCUL, he says, "I love collaboration and how I can facilitate it — and how much I get to learn every day from people across Ontario."

Alex also holds an honours bachelor's degree in computer science.

## **INFORMATION RESOURCES**

Since the 1990s, OCUL has led an extensive program of consortial e-resource purchasing and licensing to support members' academic teaching, learning and research.

OCUL provides workflow efficiencies by centrally managing and negotiating licensed content on behalf of member institutions. A significant undertaking of this work is the negotiating with publishers and vendors from around the world. Whether a license renewal or acquiring a new e-resource, negotiations involve a multistep process that provides time for member engagement, the development and approval of negotiation terms, vendor communications, and the offer period. The goal is to offer members the lowest pricing possible, extending their collections budgets and saving library staff resources in the process.

In 2022-2023, there were higher than usual increases on most renewals, due to rising costs and vendors holding pricing lower or flat during the COVID-19 pandemic. OCUL negotiated a large number of resources to reduce annual increases, with an average 2% total price increase over the previous year.

Looking ahead, the Information Resources Licensing & Local Load Subcommittee is continuing its work to develop model licenses that present an ideal set of terms and conditions, including accessibility requirements, that will be used as a starting point for vendor negotiations.

### MEET THE OCUL TEAM



CHRISTA FOLEY Assistant Director, Information Resources and Collections

Edita has a background in procurement and in early 2023, she transitioned to her new role as OCUL's Information Resources and Collections Specialist.

# SCHOLARS PORTAL

#### As a service of OCUL, Scholars Portal provides a shared technology infrastructure and shared collections for Ontario's university libraries.

Over 2022 and 2023, Scholars Portal planned and initiated several transitions to new platforms and systems as longstanding backend technologies reached the end of their lifecycle.

Exemplifying OCUL's core principle of developing and supporting robust infrastructure, Scholars Portal has undertaken three significant projects to ensure the sustainability of resource sharing and data collections across the consortium and beyond.

#### RACER – The automated interlibrary loan service

The software that RACER is built on will reach its end of life in 2024, requiring Scholars Portal to sunset the current iteration of its automated interlibrary loan service. In preparation, Scholars Portal started coordinating the transition away from the software and continued to focus on optimizing resource sharing in the shared library services platform used across a majority of OCUL member institutions. This involved working closely with OCUL and colleagues in Quebec and across Canada, plus major interlibrary loan system vendors, to test and troubleshoot communication between systems and advocate for greater interoperability between platforms. Additionally, Scholars Portal developed a one-year project map to identify potential obstacles, guide internal and member processes to minimize RACER use, and help seamless resource sharing continue.

#### Scholars GeoPortal – The geospatial data discovery tool

Scholars GeoPortal turned 10 in 2022. It's an exciting milestone but also brings the need to renew some of the technological infrastructure that supports the service. As part of this redevelopment project, Scholars Portal upgraded to the latest Esri ArcGIS Enterprise software and enabled HTTPS security for web access to the GeoPortal, which supports required maintenance updates and sets up a new environment for future enhancements. Meanwhile, a working group was assembled to draft a formal business case and list of functional requirements for the future of GeoPortal's frontend interface. The working group laid out specific recommendations for GeoPortal, such as modernizing the frontend of the GeoPortal application using the latest web frameworks and technologies, and the integration of a data loading tool that would enable OCUL member libraries to upload their own local GIS data collections to the portal. The redevelopment project started in October 2023.

#### Odesi – The social science data exploration and analysis tool

After 15 years, Nesstar, the backend repository that supports Odesi, is reaching its end of life. Borealis, the Canadian Dataverse Repository, was selected as the replacement repository to provide backend support to Odesi collections. Borealis provides extensible features for Odesi collections, including file versioning, curation, and built-in preservation for library administrators. This migration work was supported by a grant from Compute Ontario. Upon the new release, much of the data in Odesi will be open and accessible to all researchers, in the spirit of the FAIR principles (Findable, Accessible, Interoperable, and Reusable). Moving forward, OCUL is working with a variety of stakeholders and partners to develop a model for the service's ongoing sustainability.

# GOVERNANCE

#### The participation of member libraries is key to OCUL's success.

Each of the libraries is represented by its director who sits on the Council and, together as the OCUL Directors, govern the consortium's work. In addition, OCUL members are represented across 40+ groups and committees to share knowledge, support workflows, and provide important input into OCUL's shared services.

Based on a governance review that culminated in 2022, more than 20 recommendations were established to help shape the processes and structure of OCUL. Initial steps for implementation of these recommendations were underway in 2022-2023 and include:



Staff Roles and Responsibilities

Restructuring OCUL staff roles to better support assessment, governance administration and governance groups.



#### Information Management

Establishing a management process and cycle for organizational records and supporting the SPOTDocs platform and content migration.



Governance Documentation

Developing a portfolio of orientation and governance materials to improve information finding, reporting pathways and transparency.
